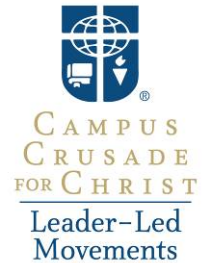


Leadership Case Studies

- Research shows that the eight (8) colleges of the Ivy League out of the approximately 2,500 universities and colleges in the United States produce 50% of the most influential leaders in the fields of government, business, education and media;
- The colleges and universities of the Ivy League have moved away from a Christian world view and ideology despite their Christian roots;
- 40% of students who first enter an Ivy League college or university say they have some sort of faith, but that number drops to 20% at graduation;
- Using the book of Nehemiah as a model of prayer, Christian Union radically changed its ministry beginning in mid-2008. Along with its Ministry Fellows on the Harvard, Yale and Princeton campuses, Christian Union's staff began praying for two hours each day;
- The results were astounding: students became involved in Christian ministries, people came to faith, lives were changed, and miracles such as healings occurred;
- As an example of the power of prayer and fasting, 250 to 300 students on the Princeton campus gather weekly for Bible studies and in fellowship groups. The impact has extended to other parts of Princeton's campus including its singing groups, the Athletic department and in the classrooms.
